As homelessness continues to rise and public encampments become more visible across communities, crisis response systems are called upon to play a central role in how we address unsheltered homelessness. This session explores a compassionate, coordinated approach to encampment response that emphasizes housing, health, and human dignity.

Participants will examine trauma-informed strategies for engaging individuals living in encampments, learn how to integrate mobile crisis teams and harm reduction services, and explore system-level partnerships that bridge the gap between crisis response and long-term housing stability.
